THE ÉCOLE SUPÉRIEURE TODAY

- One of Quebec's most important artistic institutions, preparing to mark its 60th anniversary in 2026.
- The only program in North America offering highly specialized professional training in classical dance in French.
- Three professional programs:
- Performance
- Dance instruction (ACS)
- Musical accompaniment
- One of the world's largest specialized collections of dance-related materials, held at the Bibliothèque de la danse Vincent-Warren.
- Nearly a third of the dancers hired by Les Grands Ballets are our graduates (13 of 46 dancers).
- Numerous dancers are performers with the world's most prominent companies.
- Led by artistic director Anik Bissonnette, a Quebec icon and one of Canada's three most important ballerinas.
- World-class instructors with roots in the world's great dance companies (Muriel Valtat, José Manuel Carreño, Gaby Baars, Andrea Boardman, etc.).
- One of the largest employers in the dance sector after Les Grands Ballets, with 40 permanent employees (including 14 professors and 6 accompaniment pianists) and 50 temporary employees.
- Professors and accompaniment pianists from Quebec and around the world: Argentina, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, China, Colombia, Cuba, United States, France, Japan, Netherlands, Russia, Türkiye, Ukraine...
- Nearly 720 dance enthusiasts in its recreational programs.



MISSION

The mission of the École supérieure is to train dancers and artists to the highest standards used by professional dance institutions and, in the process, to encourage the recognition, success and advancement of dance.

HISTORY

The École supérieure de ballet du Québec has its origins in the early 1950s, when Madame Chiriaeff led her first dance classes at L'École Chiriaeff. In 1958, that school became the Académie des Grands Ballets Canadiens, training dancers for the new Quebec ballet company of that name. On the request of the provincial cultural affairs ministry, which wanted Quebec to have a professional dance academy, Madame Chiriaeff reorganized her educational activities and founded the École Supérieure des Grands Ballets Canadiens in 1966. In 1980, the school obtained a charter independent of the dance company and became the École supérieure de danse du Québec. In 2011, the school was finally renamed the École supérieure de ballet du Québec (commonly known as the École supérieure).


PARTNERS

Since the school's founding, the École supérieure has trained hundreds of students.

In 2022-23, there were 171 students in the professional division, including:

10 graduating students

12 international students

12 students from Canada outside Quebec

35 students from Quebec outside Montreal
